Pet Plan During a Disaster

Pets depend on us for their safety and well-being, so be sure to include them in your family emergency plan. If you must evacuate, the most important thing you can do to protect your pets is to evacuate them with you. DO NOT LEAVE YOUR PETS BEHIND!

Take the following steps to prepare to shelter your pet:

- ➤ Call your local Emergency Management office, animal shelter or animal control office so that you can designate where pet boarding facilities are located.
- Find out which local hotels and motels allow pets. Be sure to research some outside your local area in case local facilities close.
- ➤ Have identification tags on all animals at all times. If possible, attach the address and/or phone number of owner to ID tag. Make sure you have a current photo (front/side) for identification purposes. Have pet medical records and contact information for the veterinary to prove vaccinations are current.
- ➤ Make sure you have a secure pet carrier, leash or harness for your pet so that if he/she panics, they can't escape.
- Make sure transportation equipment (cages, carriers, trailers, etc.) are checked and maintained regularly to be ready at a moments notice.
- ➤ Identify a safe location inside your home/facility in the event you cannot leave during a disaster.
- ➤ Know that, with the exception of service animals, pet *are not* typically permitted in emergency shelters as they may affect the health and safety of other occupants.
